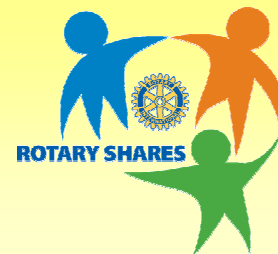

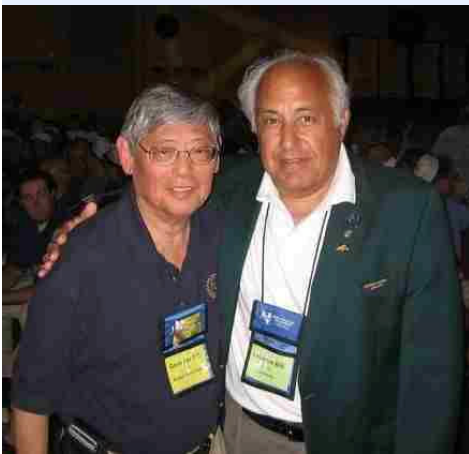
We are within striking distance of our million-dollar goal in annual giving this year but we need your support. Every Paul Harris Society member should make sure that this year's contribution has been submitted this month. Do not wait until the last minute. Every club should make sure that their last quarter's contribution is submitted by June 15th. This eliminates any confusion when RI is posting year-end contributions. If there is anyone out there thinking about joining the Paul Harris Society, now is the time. We have reached a level in annual giving above what we have ever done before at \$850,000 as of the end of April. This is a great accomplishment, but it also means that we have two more months to close the gap and reach the million-dollar mark. **NOW IS THE TIME.**

I also want to make sure we don't get the end of year syndrome on membership. Every quarter, every month, every day is the right time to bring in new members. At the end of March we were leading the US clubs in the number of members gained this year. We do not want to throw this recognition away just because clubs are cleaning up their membership lists. Membership is not a goal set to win awards; it is a goal set to make Rotary strong. More members mean more projects and more help for the children.

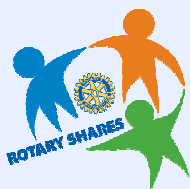

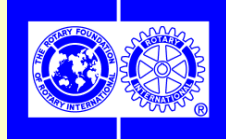

Thoughts from Our District Foundation Chair

If you were not at the District Conference in San Destin then you missed a great weekend of Fellowship and Fun. You also missed all the news about the District Foundation. We are having a great year for donations. By conference time, our annual giving amounted to \$850,000 (ranking us #2 worldwide) and our total giving was over \$1,481,000 (ranking us #3 worldwide). With a few months left before this year is over our goal of \$1,000,000 annual giving is within reach. Everyone needs to help make our "Rotary Shares" come true for Gov. Bill.

We have had a great year as far as our grants are concerned, also. Our matching Grants, with PP Sally Platt as Chairmen, spent most of our funds for 47 different clubs projects. The total amount of grants equals \$600,000 doing humanitarian projects throughout the world. **EVERY CLUB** in District 6900 applied and used a DSG. That means that over \$100,000 was spent right here in District 6900 on Community Service and Humanitarian projects. Chairmen Walt Woliver and his committee did an amazing job of getting these funds out.....now all that is left to do is to get your club reports to Walt, as soon as possible.

Awards were given out. **Best Participation in the Rotary Foundation** is given to the clubs that do a matching grant, DSG, sponsor a scholar, sponsor a team leader or member for GSE, host the GSE team, made an Ethiopia pledge, and made a Polio Plus donation. The winners were:

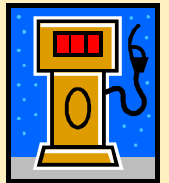

Bainbridge Sharing the 4-Way Test

The 4-Way Test was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor (who later served as RI President) when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy. This 24-word code of ethics for employees to follow in their business and professional lives became the guide for sales, production, advertising, and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy. Adopted by Rotary in 1943, the 4-WayTest has been translated into more than a hundred languages and published in thousands of ways.

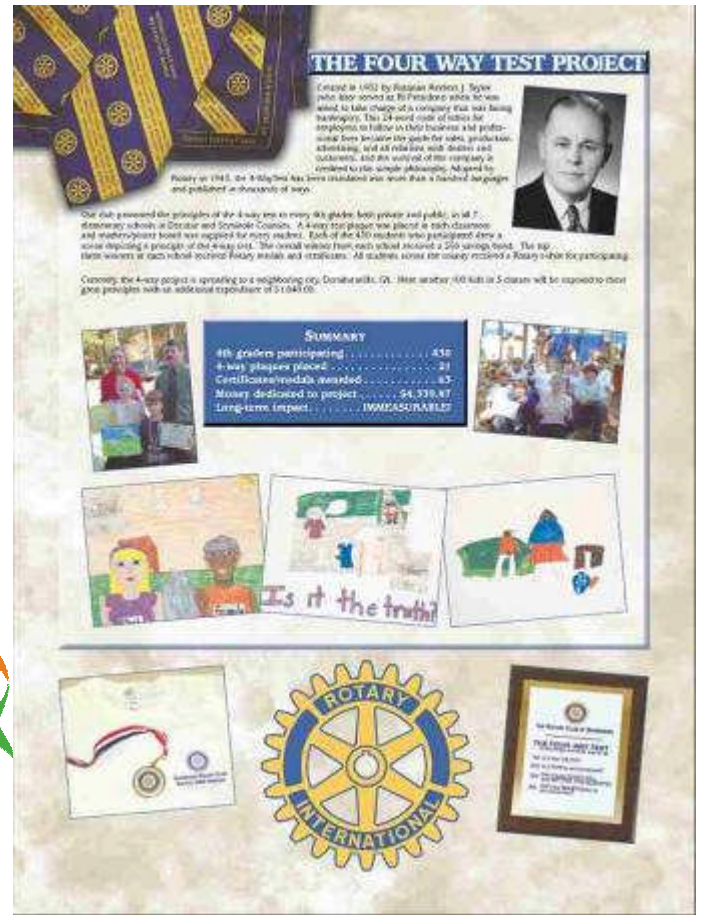
The **Rotary Club of Bainbridge** promoted the principles of the 4-way test to every 4th grader, both private and public, in all 7 elementary schools in Decatur County. A 4-way test plaque was placed in each classroom and markers/poster board was supplied for every student. Each of the 430 students who participated drew a scene depicting a principle of the 4-way test. The overall winner from each school received a \$50 savings bond. The top three winners at each school received Rotary medals and certificates. All students across the county received a Rotary t-shirt for participating.

Currently, the 4-way project is spreading to a neighboring city, Donalsonville, GA. Here another 100 kids in 5 classes will be exposed to these great principles with an additional expenditure of \$1,040.00.

Please enjoy this great moment of achievement with the **Rotary Club of Roswell East**... two countries, two churches, two Rotary Clubs, and Mexican Pastor Vale's dream of a safe, community center in a dusty, poverty stricken, drug-war torn, forgotten frontier town.

Just 3 years ago, missionary trips were dwindling to this area, as the violence and ugliness cut off the flow of outside missionaries and workers. Discouragement was setting in But there were prayers, many prayers. The pastor prayed desperately with his Mexican Methodist Church of the "Nuevo Pacto," a half-constructed building of rough concrete on a donated patch of dried mud. It was a fragile candle of hope in an enormous, growing darkness.

I met there to meet this man and these families. I saw this place, this hardscrabble land, the life of poverty and fear. I prayed with them. There is no running water, no electricity, & very little school. Many, many children -- among many, many families -- have only one place to look for hope only God could deliver -- their pastor, their church, their Savior.

From this patch of land you see over the hills to an enormous American flag, just over the Rio Grande. You can see the tops of the elegant hotels, just over the muddy water.

The Rotarians in this Mexican town are some of the bravest, gracious, and kindest people I have ever met. They are professionals fighting to save their community from an ever-present evil that is trying to destroy them. They are under siege.

They have to hold their weekly meetings in secret, as they are all marked for kidnapping. It happened three times at least in 2007, once to the brother of the President. Yet they keep on meeting, keep on pushing, and keep the candle of light alive.

Join me in congratulating these fine examples of courage under adversity, and fantastic examples to service to your fellow man.

Excerpt from the WCS Final Report ...

This grant provides the non-fixed equipment, furnishings, and learning materials for a newly established community, fellowship and food distribution center (a "comedor") for the needy in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico. The building and fixed improvements have been provided by Nuevo Pacto Methodist Church, as well as District 6900 based Roswell United Methodist Church. This community center provides nutrition and a safe place for impoverished children, teenagers, and adults in this



border community, which is increasing troubled by gangs, drug wars, and lack of adequate facilities for children and their working parents. Lunches, dinners, classes are

provided to benefit the desperately poor and disenfranchised, which is an enormous benefit.
